MYTH:

"If I surrender an animal to the shelter, I'll be banned from adopting a pet in the future."

FACT:

Animal relinquishers are NOT automatically "black listed" or banned from future adoptions.

I hear this misconception quite often in conversations with the public, and I often see it stated as fact on social media. To set the record straight:

This is NOT our policy.

There are many reasons for relinquishing a pet to CCHS. For most people it's not a quick or easy decision and when the decision is made, it's the right one. Would it make sense for us to blacklist people for doing the right thing for their animal? Absolutely not.

That said, we do keep business records. We retain information on every animal that enters our facility, every animal-relinquisher, and every adopter. So, yes, if you relinquish a pet to CCHS, it will become part of your "permanent record," but so will the circumstances.

If an adoption-applicant's record shows they surrendered an animal to us in the past, we'll take a look at the details and see if they raise any red flags. What was the reason? How long ago was it? Maybe the applicant's circumstances have changed and they're now in a better position to make the long-term commitment we're looking for.

We will deny an adoption application if something in the record suggests that the adoption would not be in the best interest of the animal. For example, if the applicant surrendered animals to us in the past and those animals were in poor physical condition and/or the relinquisher showed a lack of compassion for their pets, that might be a red flag. Another red flag would be a history of multiple relinquishments, which might suggest a compulsion to obtain pets without the ability to care for them.

But if you're worried about bringing an animal to CCHS because you found him, but can't keep him; or she belonged to a family member who went into a nursing home; or you adopted a dog and he is hard to handle – or not working out for any reason – please don't be afraid to reach out. We're here to help pet owners in crises, big or small.
